of the 15 essays in this book 11 have been published elsewhere between 1957 and 1981 they cover no single topic but range over a number of disparate texts and issues

key concepts in medieval literature introduces students to the major authors themes and genres of the english middle ages these are discussed in concise focused essays accompanied by summaries and recommendations for further reading highlighting the need to see texts in context both historically and linguistically

bringing together the insights of new fields and approaches with those of more familiar texts and methods this handbook provides a comprehensive overview of the state of medieval literature today it discusses texts such as beowulf wulf and eadwacer and ancrene wisse and authors from Ælfric to chaucer langland and the gawain poet

in the history of europe the middle ages or medieval period lasted from the 5th to the 15th century it began with the fall of the western roman empire and merged into the renaissance and the age of discovery the middle ages is the middle period of the three traditional divisions of western history classical antiquity the medieval period and the modern period the medieval period is itself subdivided into the early high and late middle ages population decline counterurbanisation invasion and movement of peoples which had begun in late antiquity continued in the early middle ages the large scale movements of the migration period including various germanic peoples formed new kingdoms in what remained of the western roman empire in the seventh century north africa and the middle east once part of the byzantine empire came under the rule of the umayyad caliphate an islamic empire after conquest by muhammad s successors although there were substantial changes in society and political structures the break with classical antiquity was not complete the still sizeable byzantine empire survived in the east and remained a major power the empire s law code the corpus juris civilis or code of justinian was rediscovered in northern italy in 1070 and became widely admired later in the middle ages in the west most kingdoms incorporated the few extant roman institutions monasteries were founded as campaigns to christianise pagan europe continued the franks under the carolingian dynasty briefly established the carolingian empire during the later 8th and early 9th century it covered much of western europe but later succumbed to the pressures of internal civil wars combined with external invasions vikings from the north magyars from the east and saracens from the south

this very short introduction provides a compelling account of the emergence of the earliest literature in britain and ireland including english welsh scottish irish anglo latin and anglo norman introducing the reader to some of the greatest poetry prose and drama ever written elaine treharne discusses the historical and intellectual background to these works and considers the physical production of the manuscripts and the earliest beginnings of print culture covering both well known texts such as beowulf the canterbury tales and the mabinogion as well as texts that are much less familiar such as sermons saints lives lyrics and histories treharne discusses major themes such as sin and salvation kingship and authority myth and the monstrous and provides a full but brief account of one of the major periods in literary history about the series the very short introductions series from oxford university press contains hundreds of titles in almost every subject area these pocket sized books are the perfect way to get ahead

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in an updated edition of his hugely successful student introduction to english literature from 1100 to 1500 j a burrow takes account of scholarly developments in the the field most notably devoting a final chapter to the impact of historicism on medieval studies full of information and stimulating ideas and a pleasure to read burrow s book deals with circumstances of composition and reception the main genres modes of meaning allegory etc and medieval literature s afterlife in modern times it shows that the literature of authors such as chaucer gower and langland is more readily accessible than usually imagined and well worth reading too by placing medieval writers in their historical context the four centuries between the norman conquest and the renaissance professor burrow explains not only how they wrote but why

originally published in 1945 this book presents a discussion of medieval literature focusing to a large extent on french literature the text emphasises the fundamental differences between the medieval period and modern times most notably the changes engendered by the invention of print as noted in the introduction if a fair judgment is to be passed upon literary works belonging to the centuries before printing was invented some effort must be made to realise the extent of the prejudices under which we have grown up and to resist the involuntary demand that medieval literature must conform to our standards of taste or be regarded as of interest purely antiquarian this book will be of value to anyone with an interest in medieval literature and literary

the influence of medieval literature is instantly apparent in modern fantasy literature where knights and wizards populate castle strewn landscapes less obvious but still recognizable is the influence in science fiction which draws on medieval story structure and themes beyond these superficial similarities deeper connections become evident through an analysis of the literature's social function like the fantasy and science fiction of today the romances of the middle ages were written in times of extreme and prolonged social upheaval in all three genres the storytellers draw on the same archetypes the hero the quest the transformation for stories whose goal is to provide hope using jungian theory and comparative analysis this book explores the connections between the three genres it finds common ground among them in plots that often reflect the recurring cycle of life and the elements of psychological rather than literal realism representative texts such as malory's *le morte d arthur* the witch world series by andre norton and more than human by theodore sturgeon are examined in depth and the use of archetypes in each is thoroughly explored analysis reveals similarities in images structures and the pervasive belief that a perfectible universe is within man's capabilities if not now then someday
